What is a research project?

A research project is something we do to learn more about something, or to find out something new. It can help doctors and nurses to find out the best way to treat children who may need their help.

Why are we doing this research project?

We want to find out why some children get illnesses like diabetes very young. This is important because it could help us understand more about diabetes and to look after young people with diabetes better.

Why have I been chosen?

You have been invited into this study because you were diagnosed with diabetes or autoimmunity very young.

What does taking part involve?

- We will arrange to see you at the hospital, clinic, or may ask for you for some blood from a fingerprick when you test your blood sugar at home.
- We may give you a pot to collect some urine (wee) in.
- If you would like, we will put some special cream or spray on your arm so that you don't feel it when we take a blood sample.
- Then we will ask some questions about your health and measure your height and weight.

What will happen to my blood and urine sample?

Your blood and urine (wee) samples will be given a special study number and stored in a freezer and some scientists will study them.

We will ask you if it is OK to keep anything that is left over for other projects in the future.

Do I have to take part in this project?

No. If you don't want to take part, that's OK and we will not mind.

If you do want to take part, we will ask you to write your name on a form, like the one on the next page, to say this.

We will also ask the person who looks after you if they agree too.

You can change your mind and stop taking part at any time and won't have to tell us why.

Has anyone else checked that this research project is OK to do?

Yes, all research projects are checked by a group of people called an Ethics Committee.

Will other people be told information about me?

We will tell your doctor if we find anything that would affect your care. We will look after your information carefully and will not tell anyone else.

Who can tell me more about this project?
